Fourth Grade Summer Reading List St. Philip's School and Community Center

Books aren't just words; they are places to go, people to meet, and adventures to experience! At St. Philip's School and Community Center, one of our many goals is to inspire a life-long love of reading within the hearts of each of our students. Toward that goal, we have devised a summer reading program with activities that will be interwoven into the coming school year.

Requirements:

1. Students are required to read <u>Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing</u> by Judy Blume, voted one of <u>Scholastic Magazine's "100 Greatest Books for Kids"</u> by Parents & Children.

Synopsis: Two is a crowd when Peter and his little brother, Fudge, are in the same room. Grown-ups think Fudge is absolutely adorable, but Peter and his pet turtle, Dribble, know the truth. From throwing temper tantrums to smearing mashed potatoes on the wall, Fudge causes mischief wherever he goes. What will the tiny terror do next?

During the first week of school, you should be prepared to discuss the theme and other information from *Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing* and complete a written exercise.

2. Students should choose ONE of the books on the attached list to read, and then complete a Cereal Box Book Report. The instructions are attached

ALL ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE GRADED AND ARE DUE ON THE FIRST DAY OF CLASS. There will be a penalty for late assignments.

Cereal Box Book Report

STUDENT GUIDE



After reading a book from the attached list, you will create a Cereal Box Book Report using these guidelines.

<u>Entire Box</u>: Cover the entire box with a large sheet of white or light-colored paper. Neatly wrapping it like a present is a good approach.

<u>Front of Box</u>: Think of a name for your new cereal that is closely related to your book. For example, for the book <u>The Lightning Thief</u>, you could name your cereal "Lightning-O's." Design the front of your box to be colorful and attractive. It should show what the cereal looks like and should also include a picture of a related prize. For "Lightning-O's," the prize might be a pen in the shape of a lightning bolt.

<u>Back of Box</u>: Every fun box of cereal has a game or puzzle on the back! Your cereal also needs one. Design and include a puzzle, word scramble, maze, crossword, or any other fun activity on the back of your box. Make sure it completely relates to your book.

<u>Right Side</u>: Neatly write a summary on the sheet provided. Cut and glue onto the right side of the box. Add some color, if you would like!

<u>Left Side</u>: All cereal boxes have a list of ingredients. Great books also have necessary ingredients, including a setting and main characters. Complete the Ingredients panel on the provided sheet. Cut and glue onto the left side of the box.

<u>Top of Box</u>: Fill out the information on the provided sheet. Would you rate your book as a l-star (pretty awful) or a 5-star (the best you've ever read) story? Color in the appropriate number of stars. Cut and paste this panel onto the top of your box.

MAIN CHARACTERS: List only the main characters, along with a description of each.

For example, if you were describing Goldilocks, you might write:

Goldilocks: She is a young girl who is very curious and feels she has to explore strange houses with unlocked doors.

Together the "star friends" help prepare Salma to be the first Blueberry Queen from outside the community while also raising money to help Lucky. You will eat up this heartwarming story and wish there were more!

The Magnificent Mya Tibbs "Spirit Week Showdown" by Crystal Allen

Nine-year-old Mya Tibbs is boot-scootin' excited for the best week of the whole school year—SPIRIT WEEK! She and her mega popular best friend, Naomi Jackson, even made a pinky promise to be Spirit Week partners so they can win the big prize: special VIP tickets to the Fall Festival! But when the partner picking goes horribly wrong, Mya gets paired with Mean Connie Tate—the biggest bully in school. And she can't get out of it.

Roller Girl by Victoria Jamieson

After one of her mom's "nights of culture" at a roller derby tournament, Astrid cannot wait to put on skates and join a junior derby camp. What she never realized was just how difficult roller derby could actually be! Lots of bruises, even more hard work, new teammates, and friends all unite in this high adrenaline graphic novel.

The Chicken Squad by Doreen Cronin

Detectives come in all forms big, small, smart... feathery? Four sleuthing chicks, Dirt, Poppy, Sweetie and Sugar, investigate the appearance of a mysterious object that just may be a UFO. It's filled with humor, heart, and a frequently fainting squirrel. Join these crazy chicks for their first big adventure!

<u>Remember the Alamo! The Runaway Scrape: The Diary of Bell Wood</u> by Lisa W. Rodgers

After a two-month siege by Texian volunteers in late 1835, the Mexican Army surrendered San Antonio and retreated across the Rio Grande. Texas colonists, including fictive young diarist Belle Wood, rejoiced. No one expected more trouble from Mexico. All over Texas, people either joined the fight for independence or fled for safety in the mass exodus known as the Runaway Scrape. Belle's diary tells how her family joins the throng heading east for the U.S. border, walking or riding in every kind of vehicle imaginable.

Unspeakable: The Tulsa Race Massacre by Carole Boston Weatherford

Celebrated author Carole Boston Weatherford and illustrator Floyd Cooper provide a powerful look at the Tulsa Race Massacre, one of the worst incidents of racial violence in our nation's history. The book traces the history of African Americans in Tulsa's Greenwood district and chronicles the devastation that occurred in 1921 when a white mob attacked the Black community.

The Amazing Age of John Roy Lynch, Don Tate.

John Roy Lynch spent most of his childhood as a slave in Mississippi, but all of that changed with the Emancipation Proclamation. Suddenly people like John Roy could have paying jobs and attend school. While many people in the South were unhappy with the social change, John Roy thrived in the new era. He was appointed to serve as justice of the peace and was eventually elected into the United States Congress. This biography, with its informative back matter and splendid illustrations, gives readers an in-depth look at the Reconstruction period through the life of one of the first African-American congressmen.

Hand in Hand: Ten Black Men Who Changed America by Andrea and Brian Pinkney.

Hand in Hand presents the stories of ten men from different eras in

American history, organized chronologically to provide a scope from slavery to the modern-day. The stories are accessible, fully-drawn narratives offering the subjects' childhood influences, the time and place in which they lived, their accomplishments and motivations, and the legacies they left for future generations as links in the "freedom chain."

Amari and the Night Brothers by B.B. Alston

Amari Peters has never stopped believing her missing older brother, Quinton, is alive. Not even when the police told her otherwise, or when she got in trouble for standing up to bullies who said he was gone for good.

Slam Dunk by Sharon Robinson.

In this lively sequel to Safe At Home, Elijah "Jumper" Breeze is settling into his new home in Harlem-though it hasn't been easy since his father died and his mother moved them from the suburbs. Still, he made friends at summer camp and he's eager to see them at his new middle school. Jumper is looking forward to hitting the books and hitting the court for some serious b-ball. Then his best friend, Kelvin, talks him into running for student council and suddenly life gets a lot more complicated!

4th – 7th Grade Summer Math Requirement:

This summer all students are required to work in *ALEKS*. Students will continue their path from the school year. Some students may have to begin by taking a diagnostic assessment when they log in. Please do not assist them as they will continue working on this program weekly throughout the year and must be able to work independently. This program will design a path to help students increase their math skills and retain concepts. Students MUST work to receive a 100% completion percentage on the current instructional level of *ALEKS*. This requirement must be completed by the 1st day of school. If students are working above grade level they should have an email with Math Summer Requirement as the subject to confirm and let them know what is required of them. See the guidelines below (Page 2) regarding what students need to do to receive credit.

Account logins for new students will be sent to parents via email by June 3rd. Students will access *ALEKS* by visiting www.aleks.com. Please print this sheet and have your student write down their log in information below, to ensure that they have this information during the summer. *Please share this information with any household where your student will spend a significant amount of time this summer.

Teachers will receive a report monthly and again at the end of the summer detailing your student's progress and this will count as a completion quiz grade. **Students not meeting the requirement will receive a 0 as their first quiz grade.** Parents will receive a weekly summary email of your student's progress. Please watch the video to listen to detailed instructions. https://youtu.be/pPPEQiYrEV8

**Please pay close attention to the number of topics that students have learned or mastered. This is the way to increase their percentage. The goal is to retain and improve your student's math skills over the summer. The results will also provide valuable information on how we can work together to ensure your student's success during the next school year.

Finally, here are guidelines for making the most out of the at-home learning experience:

- Students MUST keep an organized ALEKS journal to work out problems. They
 will include the topic title and date for each page. Do not allow your student to
 use a calculator, unless it is provided within the program for a specific problem.
 Journals are required to be turned in to your student's math teacher on the 1st day of
 school.
- 2. Please discourage your student from using external help, such as the Internet or a family member providing them with answers. Students will get the most benefit from working through the problems on their own! They can access videos on Khan Academy, Flocabulary, Math antics or Math Playground for instructional concepts and practice as needed. Topics may be done in any order. Students are encouraged to skip around to work on topics that they are more familiar with before tackling problems that may be more challenging for them.
- 3. **Don't forget that tools are available in the ALEKS program to help your student!** Tools include:
 - A Dictionary of math terms and concepts
 - An "Explanation" button providing step-by-step instructions for solving a problem
- 4. Set a regular work schedule. Students work speed may require additional time.
 - Hours Per Week: 1+
 - Number of Days Per Week: 2-3 days a week
- 5. Check your student's progress percentage often. Do NOT wait until the last week.
- 6. For 4th Grade ONLY...If your student has NOT completed Reflex math multiplication and division at 100%, keep working toward this goal in addition to ALEKS. This will help with their math fluency and success in ALEKS.
 - Access Reflex math through your Clever account to check your percentage.



DRESS CODE AND SCHOOL UNIFORM

St. Philip's School believes that emphasizing neat, clean, and appropriate attire will help students to develop good personal grooming throughout life. Haphazard grooming often encourages haphazard behavior and may interfere with a child's personal and academic progress. Adherence to this dress code is an exercise in obedience to rules and policy. We appreciate our parents' diligence in assisting their children in carefully adhering to the school uniform code.

Students shall observe the following specific requirements of the dress code:

A. General Appearance

- 1. Neat, clean, and appropriate grooming for school will be encouraged and expected.
- 2. Hair styles and cuts should reflect good taste, and be appropriate to the simplicity of the uniform. All hairstyles (natural and others) should be kept neat in appearance in adherence to our standard of excellence in all areas.
- 3. Boys may not wear earrings. Girls may wear modest earrings.
- 4. Make-up is not permitted.
- 5. No hats or caps may be worn inside the building. Adults are also asked to comply.
- 6. All shirts and blouses must always be tucked in.
- 7. St. Philip's sweaters, crewneck sweatshirts, hoodies and jackets are the only types of outer wear to be worn in the building.
- College/University T-Shirts or sweatshirts may <u>only</u> be worn on Fridays with the St. Philip's uniform skirts, shirts, slacks, or shorts.
- 9. Titans may wear any College/University apparel on Thursdays and special Fridays are Free Dress days.
- 10. No body art (tattoos) will be allowed.
- 11. No gang symbols on books, bodies, bags, or other personal belongings are allowed.

B. Basic Guidelines

 Students who come to school improperly dressed will be issued a Dress Code Violation as a warning for their 1st offense. The

- 2nd dress code violation will result in the student being sent to the Admissions Office and parents being contacted to bring the proper clothing to school. The 3rd dress code violation will require the student to be picked up by the parent/guardian and taken home for the remainder of the day.
- 2. No miscellaneous items shall be worn on, over, or under the uniform. Extra coats, jackets, and non-uniform sweaters must be removed and hung in designated areas. They may not be worn in the building (hallway, classroom, gym, or cafeteria) once the school day has begun. St. Philip's sweaters, crewneck sweatshirts, hoodies and jackets are the only types of outer wear to be worn in the building.
- 3. Long pants are not acceptable for girls at any time.
- 4. St. Philip's plaid, red, white, or blue is the only acceptable color for hair accessories.
- 5. Uniform ties are to be worn on Mondays and special days.
- 6. The official uniform must be worn on Dress for Success Mondays. Boys should wear long pants and a uniform tie. Girls should wear dresses or skirts and a uniform tie. Middle School students must wear the Navy Blazer with St. Philip's emblem. No shorts or skorts may be worn on Mondays.
- November through March is winter weather. While there is no specific winter dress code, please be sure to dress your

student wisely for the cold weather conditions.

C. Official Uniform

The official uniform can be purchased at Levines Uniform Store or Official Website. Please check with the Admission Office for specific details.

All required items of the uniform shall be worn as follows:

Uniform Girls Shoes Girls

- PK2-PK3: Black Mary Jane w/Velcro NO TENNIS SHOES
- PK4 through 8th Grades: Black and white or navy and white saddle oxford shoes are the only shoes that girls may wear.

Pre-Kindergarten 2-Years Old through 3-Years Old Girls

- White oxford (button down collar) (shirt/blouse, long or short sleeved) School Plaid or Dark Blue Jumper. (Skirts may not be worn)
- *Navy modesty shorts must be worn underneath jumper
- **Blue skorts** (no shorts or pants)
- White crew or knee socks (no lace) or white tights (no other color socks or tights may be worn). No ankle socks or footies may be worn
- School plaid cross tie
- St. Philip's red cardigan or pullover sweater with St. Philip's emblem.

Pre-Kindergarten 4-Year Olds through 3rd Grade Girls

• White shirt/blouse, long or short sleeved with button-down collar

- School plaid Jumper (Skirts may not be worn)
- *Navy modesty shorts must be worn underneath jumper
- Blue skorts
- White crew or knee socks (no lace) or white tights (no other color socks or tights may be worn). No ankle socks or footies may be worn
- School plaid cross tie
- St. Philip's red cardigan or pullover sweater with St. Philip's emblem.

4th through 5th Grade Girls Uniform

- School plaid skirt only
- The remainder of the uniform is the same as 3rd grade girls (as described above) apart from the plaid jumper.

6th-8th Grade Girls Uniform

- Khaki- skirt only
- Red logo polo
- School plaid cross tie
- **Light Blue** shirt/blouse, long or short sleeved with button-down collar and **Navy** blazer with St. Philip's emblem is required for "Dress for Success" Monday's.
- St. Philip's **Navy** cardigan or pullover sweater with St. Philip's emblem.
- *Girls <u>must</u> wear navy modesty shorts under their jumpers so that they may participate in more vigorous activities without embarrassment or undue concern about immodesty.

- White oxford (button down collar) shirt, long or short sleeved
- Navy or black socks only with uniform shoes
- No ankle socks or footies may be worn
- Red cardigan or pullover sweater with St. Philip's emblem.

<u>Pre-Kindergarten 4 Year Olds -</u> 5th Grade Boys

- Navy blue slacks with or without cuffs (no corduroy or outside labels such as Bugle Boy or Dockers)
- Black or navy belt with small buckle (mandatory for K-6th grade)
- Baggy or "sagging" pants are not permitted
- Navy walking or knee-length shorts
- White shirt, long or short sleeved with button down collar
- Navy or black socks only with uniform shoes
- No ankle socks or footies may be worn
- Red cardigan or pullover sweater with St. Philip's emblem.

6th-8th Grade Boys

- Khaki pants
- Khaki knee-length shorts
- Red logo polo
- School plaid tie (no clip-on, needs to be a full tie)
- or short sleeved with buttondown collar and **Navy** blazer with St. Philip's emblem is required for "Dress for Success" Monday's.

 St. Philip's Navy cardigan or pullover sweater with St. Philip's emblem.

Physical Education Attire

Girls and boys (1st-8th) must wear **royal blue**, cotton blend shorts and **gray** T-shirts with an official St. Philip's logo. The official P. E. uniforms can be purchased through the Squadlocker Spirit Shop. The Squadlocker Spirit Shop carries P. E. shorts, short-sleeved and long-sleeved shirts as well as sweatshirts and sweatpants. PK2-Kinder students **do not** purchase PE (Physical Education) uniforms. They will wear their sneakers with their official uniform.

1st-8th grade boys and girls may bring any type of lace-up sneaker shoes for P.E. However, they are only to be worn with the P.E. uniform. When students are in the official school uniform, the official uniform shoe must be worn. Sneakers with roller blades are not permitted (roller runners).

Free & Special Dress Days

- When "Free & Special Dress Day(s)" are awarded, the attire must represent the St. Philip's Statement of Mission and Values. When students are awarded free dress days, while on field trips or on field day, they must wear closed toed shoes.
- Additional dress guidelines will be communicated at time of "Free & Special Dress Day(s)"
- The following items do not meet the requirements of the Dress Code and <u>cannot</u> be worn on campus or while participating in academic excursions.
- Students must wear closed-toe shoes at all times while on campus and on academic excursions. Crocs, slippers, and Bubble Slides are not acceptable school footwear.
- Clothing that is sheer or reveals large amounts of skin such as a tank top or shirt/dress with spaghetti straps.
- Shirts or clothing referring to sex, drugs, alcohol, violence pertaining to degrading and distracting statements.

- Outerwear that fits tightly such as biker shorts, compression shorts and pants, tights, jegging, leggings, pajamas, yoga pants, etc. Spandex attire is not permitted.
- Shorts (for boys and girls), dresses and skirt length must reach the midthigh when seated.
- Clothing that restricts movement or makes it difficult to remove as needed.
- No one-piece, onesies, full-body, or full jumper outfits are permitted for Early Childhood and students with urinary incontinence.

No Sandals on Free Dress or Special Dress Days - Open-toed shoes are not permitted.

This policy is effective immediately and will be enforced.



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
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
